PARISH NEWS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Cursory Histories of the Saints celebrated this week:

6/10 - Landry of Paris - Landry was consecrated Bishop of Paris in 650, and he soon perceived that some proper institution was needed to care for the many sick poor in Paris. Close by his cathedral he built the first major hospital in the city, and dedicated it to Saint Christopher. So great was the need for the hospital that even Landry's munificence scarcely cared for those who, through no fault of their own, needed care and attention. The Parisians used to say that here in every single bed was a sick person, a dying person and a dead body. The hospital later changed its name to the Hotel-Dieu, and still today, north of Notre Dame, you can see the modern successor of Landry's great foundation.

6/11 - Barnabas - The Acts of the Apostles described Barnabas as a "good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith." His parent had called him Joseph, but when he sold all his goods and gave the money to the apostles in Jerusalem, they gave him a new name: Barnabas, "son of consolation." He was one of the first to welcome St Paul, and he persuaded the Christians of Jerusalem to accept Paul's claim that he was now a believer in Jesus. He, John Mark and Paul went together on the first missionary journey of the Christian church. They landed at Cyprus, and for this reason Barnabas is honored as the founder of the Cypriot church. Barnabas was a man of considerable determination and courage. He was with Paul when they preached for the first time to non-Jews and when both of them were taken for pagans' god at Lystra in Lyconia. Once Paul fell out with John Mark. In spite of Paul's extremely forceful character, Barnabas took Mark's side. The Book of Acts says, "There arose a sharp contention between them.. Barnabas took Mark with him and sailed to Cyprus." Paul chose a new ally, Silas, and went elsewhere to strengthen the churches.

6/12 - Leo III - Leo III succeeded Hadrian I on 26 December 795. Hadrian's two nephews were both enraged at the election, since both hoped to be made pope themselves. In 799 they incited a gang of young nobles to attack Leo. On Saint Mark's day Leo was riding in a procession when they dragged him from his horse, tried to cut out his tongue and attempted to blind him. Leo escaped to the monastery of Erasmus with the help of the Duke of Spoleto, and there recovered. Leo enlisted the help of the most powerful layman of the age, Charlemagne, who sent troops to guard the pope as he journeyed from Paderborn in Germany back to Rome. Charlemagne appointed learned commissioners to examine where any fault in Leo could account for the attacks made on him.. They found none. The following year Leo crowned Charlemagne and Holy Roman Emperor in Rome. He and the emperor now worked side by side to resolve quarrels throughout the Holy Roman Empire, and to combat the spread of Islam through the depredations of the Saracens, and to Charlemagne's bounty can be attributed to the churches Leo restored both in Rome and Ravenna. The saint died two years after his great ally, Charlemagne in 816.

6/14 - Methodius - Methodius, who was born in Syracuse at a time when many people in the eastern church were engaged in destroying all images of God, Jesus and the saints, courageously defended the attempt of Christian artists to inspire the faithful

by mean of beautiful icons. He had first gone to Constantinople intending to be a courtier of the Emperor, but a holy monk so much impressed him that he decided to retire from the world. He built a monastery on the island of Chios, intending to stay there for the rest of his life. But the patriarch of Constantinople, St Nicephorus, wanted Methodius by his side. Both men stood out against the destroyers of icons, but Nicephorus was deposed and sent into exile. In 842 the emperor died and his widow Theodora took control of the empire as regent for her small son. Happily, she supported those who defended icons. In 843 Methodius became Patriarch of Constantinople. He had five more years to live. Speedily he summoned a council to declare icons lawful in the church. An annual "feast of Orthodoxy", still observed in the Eastern Church, was instituted to mark this victory for reason and devotion. The saint died of dropsy on 14 June 847.

6/15 - Vitus - No one is certain when Saint Vitus lived, we are certain that he did live, probably during the reign of Emperor Diocletian. Tradition has it that Vitus was born in Sicily and secretly became a Christian at a very early age, probably about seven years old. Various tortures to which the saint was submitted have been transformed into miracles. For instance, when thrown to a hungry lion, the saint found that the beast merely licked him affectionately. Vitus's relics were transported first to Paris and then to Saxony. They were reputed to possess many healing properties, especially when epileptics prayed before them. So Vitus is the patron of epileptics, as well as of those suffering of chorea (which is still called "St Vitus's dance"). He is said to be able to avert poisoning by dog or snake bite, and is also invoked as the patron saint of dancers and actors.

6/16 - Cyricus and Julitta - At the beginning of the fourth century, when persecution was raging against Christians under the Emperor Diocletian, a wealthy and pious woman name Julitta was widowed with a 3 year-old named Cyricus. As a Christian, Julitta decided that life in her native Iconium in Lyaconia was too dangerous. Taking her son and two maids, she fled to Seleucia and to her alarm found that the governor there was savagely persecuting Christians. The four fugitives journeyed on to Tarsus. Unfortunately the governor was paying a visit to Tarsus when the fugitives were recognized. Julitta was put on trial. She brought her young son with her to the courtroom. She refused to answer any questions about herself, save that she was a Christian. Her sentence: to be stretched on a rack and beaten. The guards, about to lead Julitta away, separated Cyricus from his mother. The child was crying, and Alexander the governor, in a vain attempt to pacify him, took Cyricus on his knee. Terrified and longing to run back to his mother, Cyricus kicked the governor and scratched his face. Alexander stood up in a rage and flung the infant down some steps, fracturing the boy's skull and killing him. Cyricus's mother did not weep. Instead she thanked God. Her son had been granted the crown of a martyr. This made the governor even angrier. He decreed that her sides should be ripped apart with hooks, and then she was beheaded. Both she and Cyricus were flung outside the city, on the heap of bodies belonging to criminals, but the two maids rescued the corpses and buried them in a nearby field.

All those involved appreciate your consideration of this request.

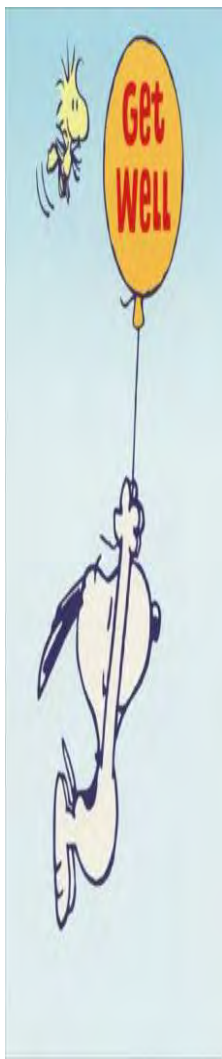
