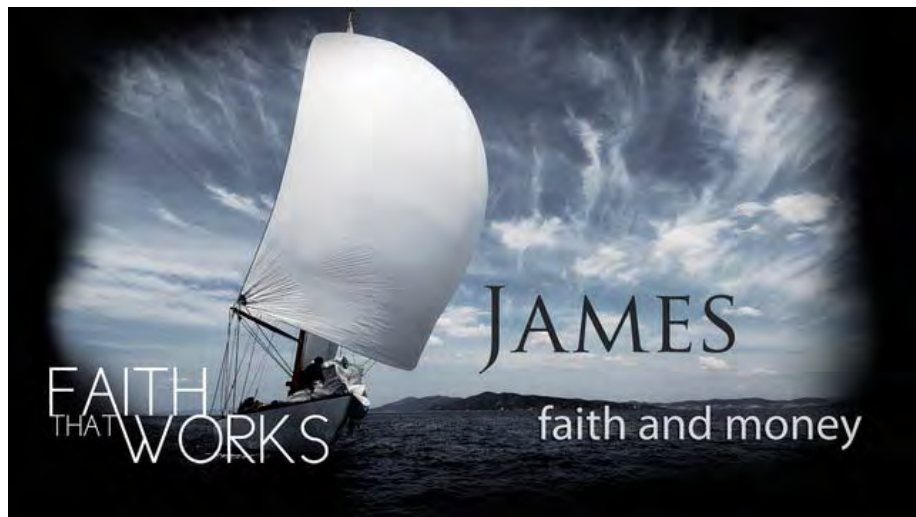

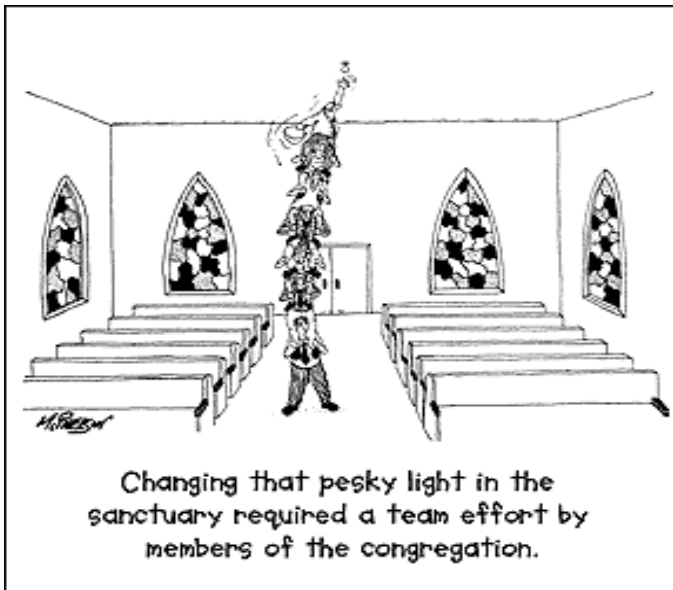

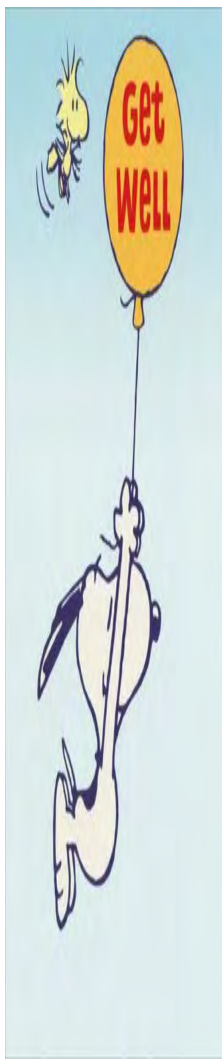

Cursory Histories of the Saints celebrated this week:

9/30 - Jerome - One of the greatest Biblical scholars of Christendom, Saint Jerome was born of Christian parents in 345. Educated at the local school, he then studied rhetoric in Rome for 8 years, before returning to Aquilea to set up a community of ascetics. When that community broke up after three years Jerome whet to the east. He met an old hermit named Malchus, who inspired the saint to live in a bare cell, dressed in sackcloth, studying the Scriptures. He learned Hebrew from a rabbi. Then he returned to Antioch and was reluctantly ordained priest. With his bishop he visited Constantinople and became friendly with Saints Gregory Nanzianzen and Gregory of Nyssa. And then in 382 he went again to Rome to become the personal secretary to Pope Damasus. Here too he began his finest work. Commissioned by the pope, he began to revise the Latin version of the psalms and the New Testament, with immense care and scholarship. Jerome eventually translated the whole Bible into the Latin version which is known as the Vulgate. But when Damasus died, his enemies forced the saint to leave Rome. Accompanied by friends, Jerome went to Bethlehem. There he lived for 34 years till his death in 420, building a monastery over which he presided and a convent. The saint set up a hospice for the countless pilgrims to that place. His scholarship, his treatises and letters often provoked anger and always stimulated those who read them. "Plato located the soul of man in the head," he wrote, "Christ located it in the heart."

10/1 - Bavo - Saint Bavo as a wealthy landowner lived a life completely devoted to his own whims. To make more money he would sell his servants as serfs to others. Only when his wife died did the saint realize how selfish his life had been. His homeland was Brabant. Resolved to start a new and better life, Bavo gave all his money away, including a large estate at Ghent. This last was offered to saint Amand, who built a monastery there. Bavo begged to enter it, and so great was his repentant life that after his death the name of the house was changed to St Bavo's. By great fortune he came across a man he had sold as a serf many years before. Bavo begged the man to lead him by a chain in humiliation as far as the city jail. Similar humility marked everything he did. Saint Amand allowed him to become his companion on missionary expeditions throughout France. The austerities even of monastic life soon seemed not enough to satisfy Saint Bavo's desire to discipline the body that he had once so much indulged. He begged Amand to give him permission to live as a hermit. When permission was given, at first, Bavo made his dwelling in a hollow tree. He later built a tiny cell in the forest. He lived on vegetables and water, seeing no one save Amand and another friend, until his death in 633. He was buried at a monastery nearby which later took the name Saint Bavo in his memory.

10/2 - The Guardian Angels - In the year that King Uzziah died the prophet Isaiah was in the Temple and saw the Lord, sitting in a throne. Six-winged seraphim flew above him, crying, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory." This notion of a multitude of heavenly beings, worshipping God and ready

to do his bidding has been taken from Jewish thought and placed at the heart of Christian worship. The ancient Jews believed that these angels served both individuals and nations. Jesus saw no reason to reject this idea. For him angels were spiritual beings. He said that they would support at this second coming. Once he took a little child and spoke to his followers becoming like children and caring for them. "See that you do not despise one of these little ones," said Jesus, "for I tell you that their angels always behold the face of my Father in heaven." The notion of Guardian angels is thus implicit in our Lord's own teaching. And in his own earthly life they are constantly seen by the Gospel-writers as ready to serve and minister to him. They succored him in the wilderness. They care for him as he agonizes in Gethsemane. Had he wished, they would have fought against his captors. They are present at his resurrection.

10/3 - Teresa of Lisieux - French, died 1897.

10/4 - Francis of Assisi - Italian, died 1226. Francis took absolutely the rule in Saint Matthew's Gospel that Christ's apostles should have virtually nothing of their own. He soon gathered followers and made out a simple rule of life for them. He loved every created thing, "brother sun", "sister moon", even loving "sister death" as God's gift. His order spread throughout Italy as more and more followers were attracted to this holy man.

10/5 - Placid and Maurus - In the early sixth century so great was the reputation of Saint Benedict throughout Christian Italy that parents longed to entrust their sons to his care. A patrician named Tertullus sent his son Placid to the saint. A rich man named Equitius sent his son Maurus. Placid was not more than seven at the time, and Maurus was twelve. Benedict was reputed to have eyes in the back of his head, like any great school teacher. One day Placid fell into the lake where they lived. Benedict, in his monastery, did not stir, calling instead to Maurus: "Hurry, brother! The child is in the water." Maurus ran to the lakeside and pulled Placid out by the hair. Later Placid was dispatched to Sicily to found a monastery, dedicated to Saint John the Baptist. Some years passed and Placid had gathered together a good number of monks there with himself as abbot. Around 546, a fleet of pirates landed and slaughtered them all.

10/6 - Bruno - Archbishop Manasses of Rheims made Bruno chancellor of the diocese in 1075. Already Bruno's career was distinguished. Born in Cologne, he had studied at Rheims University, and was made a professor of theology there. Soon he was appointed head of the whole university. Bruno soon perceived that Manasses was unfit to be archbishop. At a Council of Autun, which Manasses refused to attend, Bruno boldly denounced his patron's evil ways. Manasses in a rage expelled the saint from his diocese, but Manasses was later excommunicated by the pope. For a short time Bruno returned to Rheims when Manasses was deposed; but his aim was now to found a monastery more austere than any before. In 1084 he and six companions obtained from the Bishop of Grenoble a sparse and mountainous stretch of land. Here, living in separate cells, with a common oratory, they founded the Carthusian Order.

Dear Bishops, Very Rev. and Rev. Fathers, Deacons  
and Faithful of our Holy Church,

Sharing Our Gifts at Home and in the Parish by Fr. Scott and Shelley Lill

“Now there are different gifts but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of work, but it is the same God who inspires them all in everyone.” ~1 Corinthians 12: 4-6



While St. Paul was speaking primarily of spiritual gifts in the passage above, the same can really be said about the unique and personal talents that God gives to each one of us. While every person has unique abilities with which the Lord has gifted him or her, they are all granted for a common purpose: to use them for everyone’s good. Sometimes we may be tempted to use our special gifts only for our own benefit, but we know that this would not be pleasing to the Lord who gave them to us. Instead, we are all called to selflessly apply these talents throughout all the areas of our everyday lives, and are reminded that when we do so, wonderful things happen.

First, we actively express our thanks to the One who so generously bestowed such gifts upon us. To use them selfishly or, perhaps worse, to neglect using them at all, would be very ungrateful. When we use them, we are thanking God for our own special talents.

Second, whenever we use our gifts and talents to help others we are actually serving as co-workers with God whose work of sustaining and renewing creation in Christ continues in a wonderful way through us. In this way, the Holy Spirit is active in the world and we are his instruments.

Finally, putting our special gifts into good use leads to our receiving the wonderful fruits of the Holy Spirit among which are “love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control” (Galatians 5:22-23). Overall, whenever we generously use the special gifts that we have received from God, we are helping Him transform the still-fallen world, a little bit at a time, while we ourselves are also changed for the better. We become

more holy, which also means we become happier because we are more fully becoming the people He made us to be.

Before we can ever really use these gifts, however, we first need to discern them and then begin to hone them. All of this begins at home within the family. Parents should pray with their children, from a very early age, teaching them to continually ask the Holy Spirit to reveal to them their own unique abilities and how He wants them to use these talents. Many times, adults ask children, “what do you want to be when you grow up?” For us as Christians, however, the question should really be this: “what do you think God wants you to be when you grow up?” Prayerfully helping them begin recognizing their own giftedness and wondering why God may have given them such abilities is a first way by which parents help their children discern their lives’ vocations. This is really a life-long process that begins slowly in childhood, gradually flowers over time as children mature and develop within the family as each gift revealed by God at just the right moment in accord with his plan.

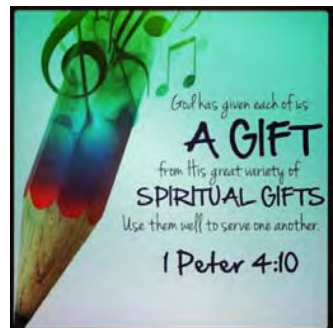
Once personal gifts are acknowledged, even if only partially at first, parents can lead their children in giving thanks to God for such talents and immediately start to encourage them to accept them with gratitude. This really means inspiring them to start using them. Parents can have creative conversations with their children to guide them—but not dictate to them—to some particular ways to use them within the home for the whole family’s benefit. This is a great way for children to not only recognize but start to polish their gifts and perfect their talents, while beginning to see the positive impact they can have in the lives of others and starting to experience the great joy that comes from this. Then, with a special contributing role initiated within the family, these unique skills can naturally be extended and put to good use in the life of the parish family. Here are just a few practical examples to demonstrate this:

In a family with a younger child who may exhibit a talent for singing and who really seems to enjoy it, the parents can help him or her realize this and then gently nudge them toward sharing it with everyone else, by giving them the honor of leading carols at the family’s Christmas Eve Wigilia. Over time, encouraged by the other family members’ recognition of their special talent and growing in their self-confidence, this gift can eventually be shared in the parish as a member of the youth or adult choirs or even as a cantor.

With a child who may be a bit older and who demonstrates an artistic ability, parents can help him or her recognize this and start to use it, perhaps by drawing pictures to cheer up members of the family who are ill. As the talent is honed and the child personally sees the benefits of sharing it, they can be asked to help make seasonal decorations for S.O.C.L. bulletin boards or crafting homemade cards for the parish’s shut-ins.

Should a family have a (pre)teenager who demonstrates a blossoming talent for leadership or emerging organizational skills, mom and dad can celebrate this as a gift from God and ask him or her to assist in getting younger siblings ready for school by organizing backpacks or packing lunches. As this ability matures, they could then assume officer roles in the parish’s youth association, help as S.O.C.L. assistants, or lend a much-needed hand in organizing the parish’s book cases or office space.

There are as many opportunities as there are children and gifts. As should be clear by now, however, the role of the parents is of paramount importance. Far be it from them



to ever discourage their children from using their special talents, parents are the first and enduring source of grateful self-confidence for their children. They are entrusted by God with the weighty and yet joyful duty of guiding them to clearly recognize, diligently develop and begin to use their unique abilities to His glory and for the benefit of others. While this starts at home and then naturally moves into the parish, their endeavors will eventually start to bear fruit throughout every aspect of their lives, as the Lord works with them and through them in ways previously unimagined.

The greatest and most important way that parents can fulfill this responsibility, though, is by setting a good example for their children. They themselves must constantly look for as-yet uncovered gifts that God has bestowed upon them, never being afraid to learn something new or to practice unmastered skills, and to share their own gifts with the family at home and in the parish family. While moms and dads could simply remind their children to pray for guidance in this every day, it's far better when the whole family prays together in this way. The whole family—parents and children—together all asking the Lord of Glory, the Giver of all good gifts, to show them all exactly how they should use their special talents serve Him and his people that day. As we continue our journey in this Polish National Catholic Year of the Family, this would be a great spiritual practice for each family to embrace. It would engender within us all a deeper, more humble gratitude to the Lord for the abundant talents with which we are all uniquely graced, and remind us that we are all commissioned to use these gifts to praise their Giver by generously serving his people everywhere.

The Synod of our Holy Church is two weeks away – let us pray for this Holy Gathering.

Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, Grant us Your grace and blessing, as we prepare to gather together in Holy Synod to seek the Lord Jesus through Your Holy Church. Send Your Holy Spirit upon our Holy Church, that we may be guided by Your Holy Will. Strengthen our bishops, clergy and laity who will gather so that their decisions at Holy Synod may help lead others to Your Son Jesus Christ. We ask this through the same Jesus Christ, Your Son, Who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen.



Please keep this church-wide undertaking in your daily prayers – asking God to bless this work and allow it to bear fruit for the building of His Kingdom through our Holy Church.
