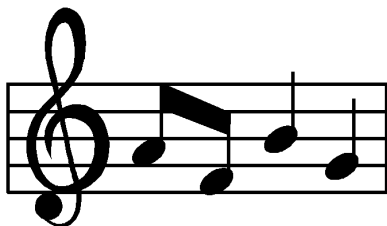

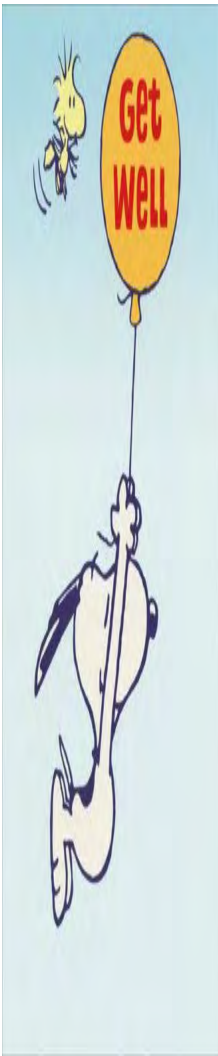

Why do they call it ordinary time?

The seasons of the Church are (beginning according to the calendar year) Lent, Easter, **Ordinary Time**, Advent and Christmas. We have been in "ordinary time" since the day after Pentecost, but I don't find it **ordinary**.

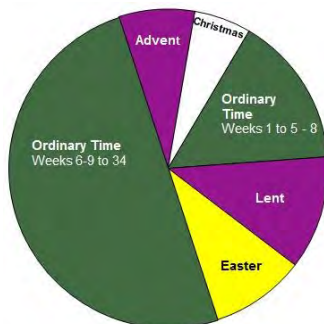
What is the symbol of ordinary time?

It is the largest season of the liturgical year. The Chi Rho, which was a symbol meaning Jesus Christ, **dates** back to the early church. Also, the official symbol of Ordinary Time is comprised of two fish and a basket of bread - **symbolizing** one of Jesus' miracles

Ordinary Time comprises two periods: the first period begins on the day after the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord and ends on the day before Ash Wednesday; the second period begins on the Monday after Pentecost, the conclusion being the Saturday before the First Sunday of Advent.

Christmas Time and Easter Time highlight the central mysteries of the Paschal Mystery, namely, the incarnation, death on the cross, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ, and the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time, on the other hand, take us through the life of Christ.

This is the time of conversion. This is living the life of Christ. Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ. The goal, toward which all of history is directed, is represented by the final Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

Cursory Histories of the Saints celebrated this week:

1/21 - Agnes - "Christ is my bridegroom," declared St Agnes. "He was the first to choose me. I shall be his alone." These fine words very much annoyed the young men of Rome in the early fourth century. Agnes possessed wealth and physical beauty. But she had not time for any of her suitors, and a number of them decided to try to force her into marriage by denouncing her as a Christian. Their plan was to persuade her to renounce her religion and thus her allegiance to Jesus rather than to marriage. This was the time of the persecutions under the Emperor Diocletian. Agnes was threatened with various savage tortures: again and again she replied, "The Lord will guard his own." The Roman governor now decided that the best way to make this girl bend to his will was to submit her to the temptations of a brothel. Any man who wished would be allowed to abuse her. Unfortunately for his plan, the saint's meekness and purity impressed even those who wanted to harm her in this way. No one would touch her. All this deeply annoyed the Roman governor. The little saint was barely thirteen years old, but he determined to kill her. The executioner tried to torment her, but she told him, "Do not delay. This body draws from some kind of admiration that I hate. Let it perish." We do not know whether she was beheaded or stabbed in the throat. At any rate, Agnes meekly turned her neck to the executioner and died. Her friends buried her near Rome, on the Via Normentana. Her fame spread. When the Emperor Constantine wished to baptize his daughter, he did so near the spot where Agnes was buried. And a few years after her death the church of Sant' Agneses was erected over her grave. In Christian art, her emblem is a lamb.

1/22 - Vincent of Saragossa - In the early years of the fourth century there seemed no limit to the brutality with which Christians were abused by their pagan persecutors. When Saint Vincent was ordained by the Bishop of Saragossa and ordered to minister to that part of Spain, the governor Dacian was doing his utmost to stamp out Christianity. He killed 18 believers at Saragossa in 303. Then he arrested Vincent. Vincent had no intention of giving up his Christian faith. Dacian banished the Bishop of Saragossa, but he decided to try to break Vincent's will. He ordered that Vincent's body should be stretched out on a rack, while other men tore the saint's flesh with great hooks. Then he had the saint laid out on a gridiron of heated bars. This did not kill the saint, who still refused to give up his faith or even to tell Dacian where he had hidden his sacred books. The governor realized that he could not break the will of the saint and ordered his soldiers to give up the torture and throw Vincent into a foul prison. Some Christians came to care for him, cleaning his wounds and laying the saint on a soft bed. But he had suffered too much pain to go on living; he died, still praising Jesus. Dacian's hatred of Vincent

persisted after the saint's death. Not wishing anyone to give Vincent a decent burial, he ordered that the corpse should be flung into a bog. Dacian hoped that the wild beasts would eat the mortal remains of this saint, but a raven seems to have decided that this corpse needed special protection. Whenever a wild beast tried to attack the holy relics, the raven drove them away.

1/23 - Ildefonsus - Saint Ildefonsus, Archbishop of Toledo, was sitting on the bishop's throne in his cathedral when he was granted a vision in which the Virgin Mary presented him with a chasuble. The gift was a fitting one, for Ildefonsus adored the Virgin. He saw worship of Jesus as the supreme duty of a Christian, and he believed that one could do so by meditating on Jesus through the eyes, as it were, of his Virgin mother. Ildefonsus's parents were from a noble Spanish family. He longed to become a monk. They opposed his wishes; but the saint nevertheless professed himself a member of a monastery near Toledo. The other monks recognized his deep spirituality and wisdom by making him their abbot. About 15 years later he was consecrated archbishop. For 9 years he governed the church wisely, until he died peacefully in 667. The grateful Spaniards dubbed him a Doctor of the Church and his memory is revered to this day.

1/24 - Francis de Sales - French, born 1567.

1/25 - Conversion of St Paul - Saint Paul, originally named Saul, was born a Jew, in a place called Tarsus. He grew to hate the Christians, believing they were preventing the truths of his own religion. He came, says Acts, "breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord." The first Christian martyr, St Stephen, was stoned to death by a vicious crowd. Saul was present, and although he threw no stones, Acts says he was "consenting to Stephen's death." After devout men had buried Stephen's body, Saul ravaged the church. He entered house after house where he supposed Christians lived or were hiding, and dragged them away to prison. So great was Saul's anger against the early Christians that he went to the High Priest in Jerusalem asking for special permission to seize the Christians of Damascus and bring them to Jerusalem for punishment. The High Priest gave him a letter with such orders, and Saul set off for Damascus. On the way there he was struck to the ground by a sudden flash of light from heaven and a voice cried out, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" When Saul cried, "Who are you Lord?", the voice replied, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." Jesus then ordered Saul to journey to Damascus and visit a Christian named Ananias. Saul had been blinded by the flash of light, but he did as he was ordered by Jesus' voice, and Ananias, in spite of fearing what Saul might do to him, welcomed the persecutor. At Damascus he earned from the Christians about their faith. Then he amazed those who worshipped in the Jewish synagogues by telling them that he now believed Jesus to be the Son of God. Some of them decided to try to kill this convert to Christianity, but he escaped from Damascus by getting his new friends to lower him over the walls in a basket during the night. As Saul perceived the truth about Christianity, his eyesight returned. And to symbolize his new life, he took a new name: Paul.

1/26 - Paula - Paula, who was throughout her married life deeply content, was grief stricken when her husband died in 379, when she was only 32 years old. She comforted herself through her children - her four daughters and her son. Then came a further blow to her earthly happiness: her eldest daughter fell seriously ill and died. Paula had by this time become the friend of St Jerome. She had coped with the death of her husband by devoting herself to God, giving up earthly treasures, sleeping on sackcloth, eating little and indulging in nothing immoderately. But the death of her daughter overwhelmed her. Fortunately Jerome arrived at Bethlehem and learned all this. He wrote sternly to his dear friend. Paula was right to mourn her husband and daughter; but she ought also, said Jerome, to realize that they had entered a realm of greater happiness than this world can offer. Paula determined on a new life. With her third daughter she left Rome for ever and met Jerome, who had now moved to Antioch. The three of them went on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and finally settled at Bethlehem. Paula and her daughter were content to live in a tiny cottage instead of the sumptuous Roman villa of their birth. They used their wealth to build a hospice, a monastery and a convent for women. Everyone dressed in exactly the same fashion, quite simply, showing that they were all equal in God's sight. When Paula first entered Bethlehem, she cried, "I greet you, Bethlehem, the "house of Bread", for here was born that living Bread who came down from heaven." The bread of heaven, she believed, satisfied all her needs. No longer did she and her companions care to find food. In fact, she gave away so much money that towards the end of her life she and her companions were quite short of money. But nothing troubled them, and Paula herself died in peace aged 57 on 26 January 404. She was buried near Jesus' birthplace.
