

Cursory Histories of the Saints celebrated this week:

9/9 - Peter Claver - Spanish, c. 1610

9/10 - Nicholas Tolentino - Born at Sant'Angelo, Ancona, in 1245 to middle-aged parents who had almost despaired of being sent a child, Nicholas was brought up as a special gift from God. His mother used to say that God had destined her son to be a saint, and she made sure he came under the influence of their parish priest. When the young Nicholas heard an Augustinian friar preaching of the text, "Do not love the world, nor those things that are of the world," he was fired to join the Augustinian order. For a while he thought his vocation lay in a monastic community, but one day as he prayed he heard a voice calling, "To Tolentino." Soon he was sent to preach and serve that town, and there he stayed for 30 years until his death in 1305.

9/11 - Protus and Hyacinth - In 1845 a priest named Joseph Marchi was excavating part of the Old Salarian way in Rome when he found a wall tomb, shut up with a slab on which was inscribed in Latin, "Buried on 11 September the martyr Hyacinth". Joseph Marchi opened the tomb and found inside a piece of cloth, wrapped around human ashes and fire-blackened bones. Another inscription close by Hyacinth's tomb read: "The tomb of the martyr Protus." According to ancient legend, Protus and Hyacinth were the slaves of Eugenia, the Christian daughter of a prefect of Egypt. She and her two faithful servants fled from Egypt to Rome where they were captured by the pagan authorities and put to death by fire. Almost certainly the martyrdom took place during the reign of the Emperor Valerian.

9/12 - Victoria Fornari-Strata - began the order of "Blue Nuns", Italy, died 1617.


9/13 - John Chrysostom - John Chrysostom, against his own wishes, was made Patriarch of Constantinople in 398. But in 403, at the Synod of the Oak, John's enemies conspired to have him deposed and exiled. In exile he wrote many letters which reveal hardships he endured, and his enemies eventually ensured that he died, as a result of forced marches in frightful weather. His health had been impaired by the savage austerities he imposed in himself as a hermit. This physical breakdown was what made him return from the mountains to city life and ordination. A trained lawyer, he now

used his marvelous oratorical powers to expound the Scriptures in a powerful series of sermons which earned him the title "golden-mouthed" (or Chrysostom). He was one of the finest preachers of all time and many of his sermons survive. He said, for instance, that for a believer, "death is a rest, a deliverance from the exhausting labors and cares of this world. So when you see one of your family departing, do not fall into despair. Think deeply. Examine your conscience. Cherish the thought that soon this end awaits you too." He added: "think to whom the departed has gone - and take comfort."

9/14 - Notburga - servant, English, died 1313.

9/15 - Nicomedes - The Emperor Constantine thought that the relics of the saints and martyrs were worthless objects, and that anyone who collected the bones of the holy ones was a fool. He therefore set about finding as many of these sacred remains as he could and throwing them into the sea. Pope Pascal I (817) disagreed. Whereas Constantine had got rid of saintly bones, Pascal I conceived it his duty to find as many replacements as possible. The church of Santa Prassede in Rome is filled with all that he collected, their names inscribed on marble tablets. Amongst them are the earthly remains of Saint Nicomedes; he had been a priest, possibly very early in the second century, in the years when Christians had to keep their faith secret or be killed. His own beliefs came to light when he bravely obtained the bones of another martyr, Saint Felicula. Nicomedes was given the chance of apostatizing by offering sacrifice to heathen gods. "I sacrifice only to the almighty God who rules over us all from heaven," was Nicomedes' response. Nicomedes had signed his own death warrant. He was beaten with whips that had been made crueller by means of lead lining, and under this torture, died. The saints' body was thrown into the River Tiber, so as to deny it the Christian burial Nicomedes had granted Saint Felicula. But another Christian named Justus boldly rescued it and placed the corpse in a tomb on the Via Nomentina, just outside the Porta Pia. And there it remained till 817.

Dear Bishops, Very Rev. and Rev. Fathers, Deacons
and Faithful of our Holy Church,

Sharing Our Gifts at Home and in the Parish by Fr. Scott and Shelley Lill

“Now there are different gifts but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of work, but it is the same God who inspires them all in everyone.” ~1 Corinthians 12: 4-6



While St. Paul was speaking primarily of spiritual gifts in the passage above, the same can really be said about the unique and personal talents that God gives to each one of us. While every person has unique abilities with which the Lord has gifted him or her, they are all granted for a common purpose: to use them for everyone’s good. Sometimes we may be tempted to use our special gifts only for our own benefit, but we know that this would not be pleasing to the Lord who gave them to us. Instead, we are all called to selflessly apply these talents throughout all the areas of our everyday lives, and are reminded that when we do so, wonderful things happen.

First, we actively express our thanks to the One who so generously bestowed such gifts upon us. To use them selfishly or, perhaps worse, to neglect using them at all, would be very ungrateful. When we use them, we are thanking God for our own special talents.

Second, whenever we use our gifts and talents to help others we are actually serving as co-workers with God whose work of sustaining and renewing creation in Christ continues in a wonderful way through us. In this way, the Holy Spirit is active in the world and we are his instruments.

Finally, putting our special gifts into good use leads to our receiving the wonderful fruits of the Holy Spirit among which are “love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control” (Galatians 5:22-23). Overall, whenever we generously use the special gifts that we have received from God, we are helping Him transform the still-fallen world, a little bit at a time, while we ourselves are also changed for the better. We become

more holy, which also means we become happier because we are more fully becoming the people He made us to be.

Before we can ever really use these gifts, however, we first need to discern them and then begin to hone them. All of this begins at home within the family. Parents should pray with their children, from a very early age, teaching them to continually ask the Holy Spirit to reveal to them their own unique abilities and how He wants them to use these talents. Many times, adults ask children, “what do you want to be when you grow up?” For us as Christians, however, the question should really be this: “what do you think God wants you to be when you grow up?” Prayerfully helping them begin recognizing their own giftedness and wondering why God may have given them such abilities is a first way by which parents help their children discern their lives’ vocations. This is really a life-long process that begins slowly in childhood, gradually flowers over time as children mature and develop within the family as each gift revealed by God at just the right moment in accord with his plan.


Once personal gifts are acknowledged, even if only partially at first, parents can lead their children in giving thanks to God for such talents and immediately start to encourage them to accept them with gratitude. This really means inspiring them to start using them. Parents can have creative conversations with their children to guide them—but not dictate to them—to some particular ways to use them within the home for the whole family’s benefit. This is a great way for children to not only recognize but start to polish their gifts and perfect their talents, while beginning to see the positive impact they can have in the lives of others and starting to experience the great joy that comes from this. Then, with a special contributing role initiated within the family, these unique skills can naturally be extended and put to good use in the life of the parish family. Here are just a few practical examples to demonstrate this:

In a family with a younger child who may exhibit a talent for singing and who really seems to enjoy it, the parents can help him or her realize this and then gently nudge them toward sharing it with everyone else, by giving them the honor of leading carols at the family’s Christmas Eve Wigilia. Over time, encouraged by the other family members’ recognition of their special talent and growing in their self-confidence, this gift can eventually be shared in the parish as a member of the youth or adult choirs or even as a cantor.

With a child who may be a bit older and who demonstrates an artistic ability, parents can help him or her recognize this and start to use it, perhaps by drawing pictures to cheer up members of the family who are ill. As the talent is honed and the child personally sees the benefits of sharing it, they can be asked to help make seasonal decorations for S.O.C.L. bulletin boards or crafting homemade cards for the parish’s shut-ins.

Should a family have a (pre)teenager who demonstrates a blossoming talent for leadership or emerging organizational skills, mom and dad can celebrate this as a gift from God and ask him or her to assist in getting younger siblings ready for school by organizing back packs or packing lunches. As this ability matures, they could then assume officer roles in the parish’s youth association, help as S.O.C.L. assistants, or lend a much-needed hand in organizing the parish’s book cases or office space.

There are as many opportunities as there are children and gifts. As should be clear by now, however, the role of the parents is of paramount importance. Far be it from them



to ever discourage their children from using their special talents, parents are the first and enduring source of grateful self-confidence for their children. They are entrusted by God with the weighty and yet joyful duty of guiding them to clearly recognize, diligently develop and begin to use their unique abilities to His glory and for the benefit of others. While this starts at home and then naturally moves into the parish, their endeavors will eventually start to bear fruit throughout every aspect of their lives, as the Lord works with them and through them in ways previously unimagined.

The greatest and most important way that parents can fulfill this responsibility, though, is by setting a good example for their children. They themselves must constantly look for as-yet uncovered gifts that God has bestowed upon them, never being afraid to learn something new or to practice unmastered skills, and to share their own gifts with the family at home and in the parish family. While moms and dads could simply remind their children to pray for guidance in this every day, it's far better when the whole family prays together in this way. The whole family—parents and children—together all asking the Lord of Glory, the Giver of all good gifts, to show them all exactly how they should use their special talents serve Him and his people that day. As we continue our journey in this Polish National Catholic Year of the Family, this would be a great spiritual practice for each family to embrace. It would engender within us all a deeper, more humble gratitude to the Lord for the abundant talents with which we are all uniquely graced, and remind us that we are all commissioned to use these gifts to praise their Giver by generously serving his people everywhere.

The Synod of our Holy Church is one month away – let us pray for this Holy Gathering.

Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, Grant us Your grace and blessing, as we prepare to gather together in Holy Synod to seek the Lord Jesus through Your Holy Church. Send Your Holy Spirit upon our Holy Church, that we may be guided by Your Holy Will. Strengthen our bishops, clergy and laity who will gather so that their decisions at Holy Synod may help lead others to Your Son Jesus Christ. We ask this through the same Jesus Christ, Your Son, Who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen.

Bible Study for Ordinary Week 23 –

9/ 9 – Psalm 137:1-9 – Do I *never* have feelings of outrage, hatred, desire for revenge? Am I being honest with myself?

Prayer starter: *You, Heart-Knower of all human beings, give me the courage to be clear and honest in my own heart to remember that feelings are helpful messages from me to me. What I am responsible for is my reaction to them.*

9/10 – Psalm 40:1-17 – Hearing and obedience, rather than ritual: how does that jibe with my idea of religion?

Prayer starter: *Spirit of Patience, give me insight! Help me to discern when waiting and patience would be the best response to a situation, and when they would not. That can be tricky.*

9/11 – Psalm 94:1-23 - Unexpected negative events: How do I handle them? maintain my equilibrium? learn from them?

Prayer starter: *Lord, I want to work on the quality of my **daily life with others, with you, to become more the "mast of my ship". Make my spirit steady and willing.***

9/12 – Psalm 111:10 – What are my genuine feelings before God? Do I tremble with fear? With awe-full joy?

Prayer starter: *Lord God, let me grow daily in appreciation for the fact that you are always there as I get my life together.*

9/13 – Isaiah 56:1-2 & 58:13-14 – What about “Sabbath” time at regular intervals in my life? Do I really what such a thing?

Prayer starter: *Holy One, everything seems to conspire **against my undertaking to use "real" time for "Sabbath" time. Help me to see my way.***

9/14 – Psalm 1:1-9 – What fills my inner world? Most assuredly, it is shaping my perceptions and attitudes.

Prayer starter: *Lord, it is an awesome thing to take account of this fact: a human being really does become what he or she **"eats," intellectually, not just physically.***

9/15 – Proverbs 29:18 – Have I experienced a situation like this in my own life? How did I “get a grip”?
